J. Sargeant Reynolds Community College to Host “Science Night”

Richmond, Va. (September 26, 2007) – The Fourth Annual J. Sargeant Reynolds

Community College Science Night will be held on Wednesday, October 10 on the

Parham Road Campus in Georgiadis Hall – Room 101 (The Gallery) from 7:00 p.m. –

9:00 p.m.

The program will include the following presentations:

- “Real CSI – The Skeletal Remains” by Professor of Biology Dr. James H. Martin III. Dr. Martin will demonstrate with skulls and other bones how crime scene investigators determine the gender of human remains at a crime scene. He will also explain how these differences affect male and female movement and characteristics in the living organism.
- "See America First" by Associate Professor of Geology David H. Walz. The North American continent is very diversified – arid deserts bounded by majestic, snow-covered, mountain chains, rocky, shelly, and sandy shorelines, great, sinuous river systems, expansive, flat steppes, active, slow-moving glaciers, semi-tropical, grassed savannahs. Walz will give a tour of the landscape and biota of the physiographic provinces of the continent during his presentation.
- “Expedition to the Galapagos” by Associate Professor of Natural Science James E. Ezell. Ezell will share his experiences from his trip to the Galapagos Islands this past summer. During his presentation he will describe the unique and special characteristics of the islands' geology, flora and fauna.

“Dr. Martin’s “Real CSI-The Skeleton Remains” presentation is going to be a fabulous opportunity for science and crime buffs,” said Roland Moore, JSRCC Dean of Mathematics & Science. “Plus, the other two presentations will be really interesting sessions for anyone who enjoys science or just wants to hear what is new in the field.”

Each topic will cover about 20 minutes, followed by a question and answer session. The free event is open to the public.

Serving over 17,000 students annually, JSRCC is the youngest and third largest of 23 community colleges in Virginia. The College consists of three campuses to serve residents in the City of Richmond and the counties of Henrico, Hanover, Goochland, Powhatan and Louisa.
